

Some encouragement from the story of Noah....



I would like to start by telling you that you are not alone, you may be in isolation, like us. God is with you, God's Holy Spirit is with you.

I am reminded of the balloon from the All Age service last month. First we blew up a balloon with all our worry and anxiety and then let it go - all that worry and anxiety zipped the balloon here and there without purpose. Then we imagined filling the balloon with God's love tying the Holy Spirit at the end. No longer did the anxiety send the balloon zipping everywhere without purpose. The balloon was round and large and full and bouncy! Just like a balloon should be.

There are so many messages of hope and love for us in the story of Noah. God sees that Noah is a good and faithful man. God wants to save him, his family and the creatures of the earth. God tells Noah what to do; he has to build an ark, a place of safety. The instructions are specific: take what you need; bring the animals; exact details of the boat he is to build are given. Noah was obedient to God.

Then they have the time of preparation, the boat is built. I measured the boundary of St Paul's church grounds to picture the scale! The church grounds are 68m x 48m. The ark was 133m x 22m so very similar in overall size, but just in a different shape. The ark had 3 floors. It was huge.

After forty days and forty nights of rain, even the tallest mountains were covered with water. When they looked from the window all they could see was water. They were on the water for 300 days! Yet in the midst of all this there is an amazing promise; "God remembered Noah and his family and all the creatures on the ark."

For the last 6 weeks or so of their journey, they all wait in the ark with the roof off, for the land to finish drying. They can smell the earth, they can see

the earth, but they have to be patient. Can you imagine their excitement after a year on the ark? God invites everyone out of the ark. What an amazing invitation. Were they cautious at first or did they all come out in a huge surge of humanity?

I have seen this week in the news people who are living in isolation singing and talking with each other from their balconies. The streets are empty, yet there is still life. Everyone is waiting... What will we have found after our periods of isolation? Will the world have been washed clean? Will we realise how we can care for our broken world and for each other? Will this Global crisis draw us together to care for one another, and draw us towards God, or will we allow the fear to rip us apart? I hope and pray that we are drawn together.

When Noah, his family and the creatures leave the ark they enter into a covenant with God, a Covenant is a solemn promise made by the spilling of blood. When Jesus came he created a new covenant so that we his children could have full Covenant with God. But here after the Great Flood is the first Covenant that God makes with humanity. Noah makes an altar and together they worship God. God promises that the earth will never be completely flooded by water again. The rainbow is a sign of that covenant between God and all the creatures of the earth.

Last week as I was walking home with my children we saw a double rainbow over Staines, and we spoke together of God's promise to us. God will hold us close through the storms and floods of this coronavirus; God will grow us and take us deeper in our relationship with him.

If you have to isolate yourself or are already in isolation hold fast to the blessings and promises that we can learn from Noah's story. Remember the Covenants that God made to us through both Noah and Jesus' death on the cross.
